

Stories are all around us. We read them in books. We listen to them on podcasts. We watch them on Netflix. Stories do more than entertain; they have a way of shaping our world. Before they shape our own, they transport us into another world. We enter in, either as a fly on the wall or a character we relate with. Often we are the hero. Like a dream unfolding we watch the story play out. The hero is us; and yet, we know not what they will do next. Before you know it, you know what they are thinking and feeling. This is the power of story.

We have been meeting Jesus at the table. These stories started coming to life as a table emerged out of nowhere into our sanctuary. The church kitchen began filling with people making food as we gathered around tables to eat. Conversations started growing around the table. These stories became a little bit more real. Jesus was more flesh and bone and yet not any less divine. We witnessed miracles. We witnessed audacious interruptions of Jesus' feet washed with tears and perfume. We listened to a story of a great banquet where the expected guests refused their invitations and so the invitation was sent out to the rest of us. The marginalized folks who never get invited were invited to a feast. God continues to invite us into the story.

The bible is full of stories. These stories have been told over and over again for hundreds of years. They are not stories of perfect people but rather broken people. They are what my dad would call down-to-earth folks. Just look at the book of Genesis and we see persons with problems. Father Abraham is the father of a dysfunctional family. This is the root of the entire Jewish lineage. Such stories are not told for us to repeat such dysfunction but rather to tell a better, more interesting story with our own lives.

As we gather around tables there are often multiple generations sitting together. Each generation has a different story to tell. The younger generation looks to the older generation for stories. The church has a beautiful tradition of passing on stories. These stories shape us. They shape how we view the world. The story benefits the teller and the audience. May we all tell our stories.

As a church we are casting out a new vision as we ask God what the story for Holt United Methodist Church is. The story is being played out in real time. We each have a role to play in the story. How is God working through you? What story is being played out around us as the spirit weaves a beautiful tapestry? Where are we going to meet Jesus next?

In Michigan, we are proud to support the expansion of the campus as well as the services of United Methodist Community House in Grand Rapids. The UMCH was started in 1902 by a group of Grand Rapids United Methodist Women who began by offering classes for kindergarten and early elementary girls. By the second year, boys were included, and the programs provided were Bible study, citizenship, cooking, sewing and crafts. Today UMCH provides care, services, and counseling to families, for infants, children, youth, adults, and seniors. In the past 18 months, UMCH has introduced The Fresh Market that offers affordable access to healthy, locally sourced food to Kent County residents while supporting Michigan growers and good food systems. Other UWFaith National Mission Institutions nearby are Red Bird Mission in Kentucky (where HUMC folks visit annually) and the Friendly Center in Toledo, Ohio.
